Mr. Sims presented the yearly service award and the scholarship awards.

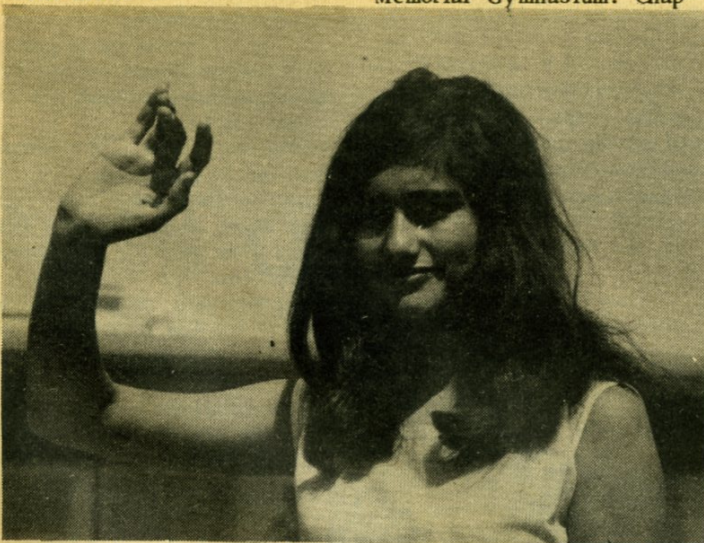
Mr. Beeson distributed the Bank of America awards and presented the citizenship award.

Loss of a brother

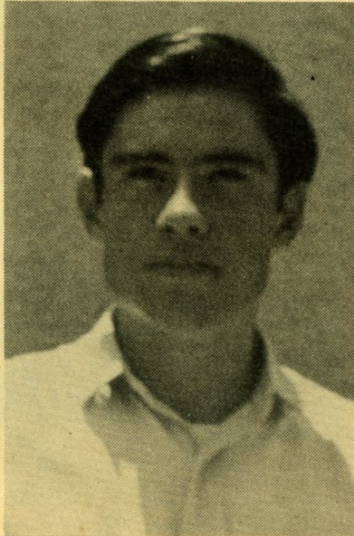

Paul Peters: "I'm glad to get out of school and I know all the teachers are, too. Do I have to answer that?"

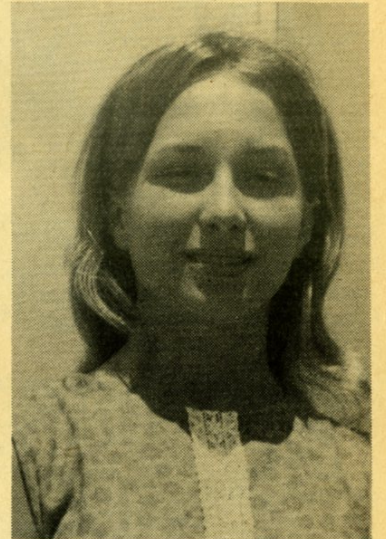

Judy Bogan: "I'm glad to be graduating but I'll miss all my friends next year. I plan to go to summer school and then I'll go to the beach."

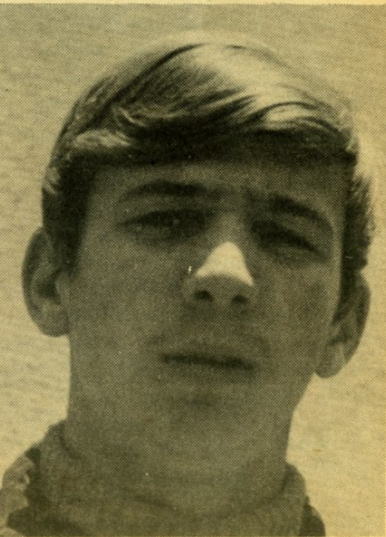
Lynn Carter: "I had fun going to school here. I'll miss all the people I met in school but I'll be glad to get out. In other words, Yippee!"

"From six to ten weeks."

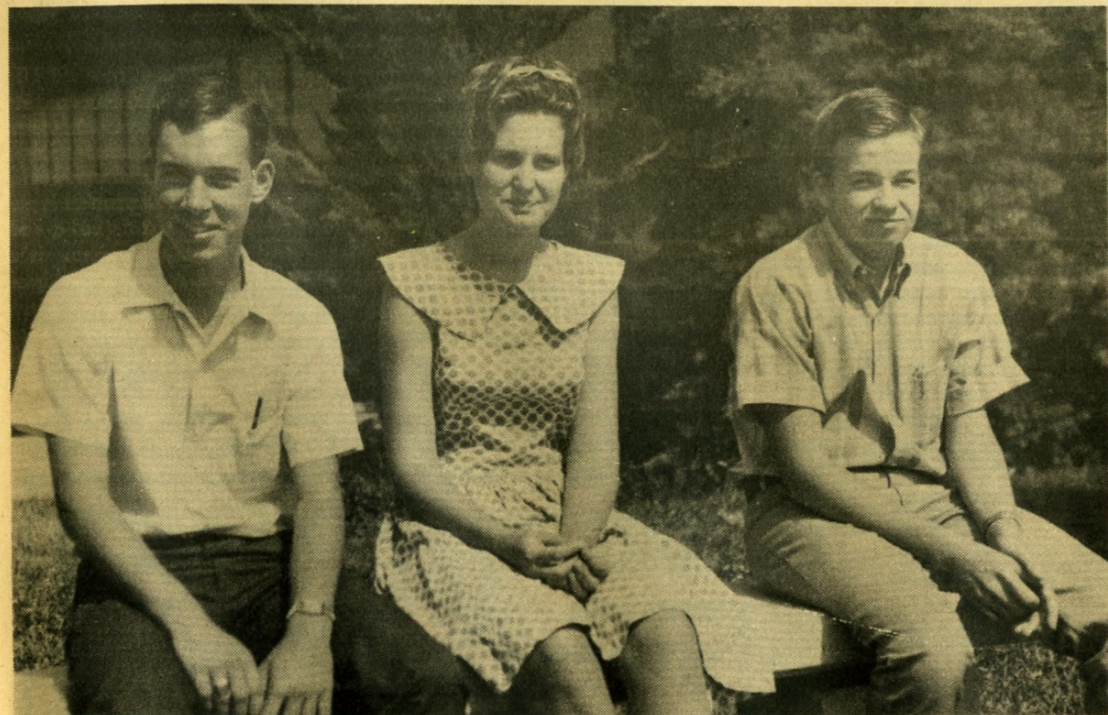
Do you believe foreign exchange programs lead to a better understanding among people?

ESTHER MATHAI will study languages and politics in preparation for the diplomatic service. Her most useful and best liked course was senior problems. She profited most from the American Field Service.

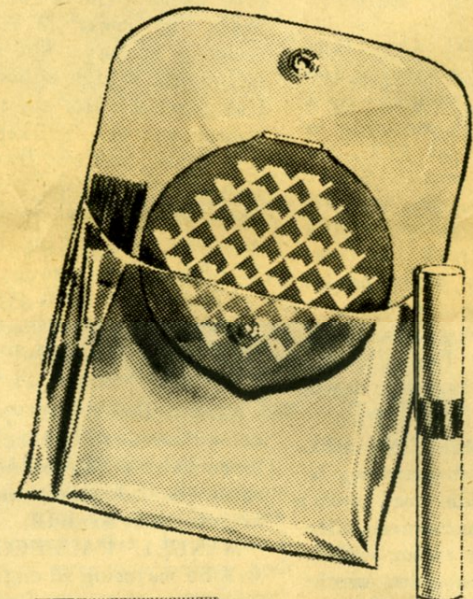

Graduates on UCR Dean's List

Three members of Perris High's Class of 1963, Cindy Zeiders Stewart, David Jorcan, and Jim Sims, son of our principal, have been named to the UCR Dean's List.

Cindy, an art history major planning to enter the field of elementary school teaching, expects to graduate this fall. She feels "honors class", a general liberal arts-humanities class for college preparatory students (no longer offered), was her most helpful high school course.

Cindy suggests an expansion of the science and mathematics programs to provide better preparation for college attendance. She considers advanced biology, as offered, very helpful.

On the whole, she thinks Perris High is a good school. What she got out of it personally may have benefitted her more than others, as she was active in student government. She was elected student body vice president, and later became President.

"It's very nice to have a high school the size of Perris," Cindy concluded, noting that the small size makes for a more "cohesive" student body.

David, an economics major, became interested in this field as a result of university counseling and a number of aptitude and interest tests. He feels competent in this course and finds a good deal of satisfaction in this type of work.

Upon graduation, he intends to enter the Air Force. After military service he plans to work toward an MA in Economics, in preparation for a career as a professional economist in either government service or private industry.

He, too, maintains that the Honors Program, was the most beneficial course in high

school as it provided a good, broad understanding of many situations and problems encountered in college.

David feels that in general he received a good solid education that prepared him adequately for university study. He adds, however, that university-bound students could profit from more concentration in the fields of foreign relations and social sciences.

Jim Sims, a fellowship recipient who will receive a BA Degree in drama this month, will enroll in Brandeis University, Waltham, Massachusetts, this fall to study acting in the theater arts department. He will work toward an MFA (Master of Fine Arts) Degree to qualify him to teach or work in acting and directing.

Jim was helped most in high school by college prep classes, generally, especially English, and the "honors class". The latter provided college-level training in various areas of the humanities, and gave him the needed background for entering a liberal arts program at a university such as UCR. He indicates

that professors in such institutions assume that one is familiar, for example, with such classics as those of Chaucer or Homer. The "honors class" helped one learn how to learn, so to speak, which is mainly what a college student is doing in his first two years. For example, he must learn first HOW to analyze a literary work, and HOW to express his interpretation.

Jim hopes that "honors class" will be repeated again, with its accompanying activities, (cultural field trips, concerts, plays, etc.).

Also very helpful while in high school was his participation in student activities. He asserts that such activities kept him interested in school, as he was bored by the academic life. Student government, he says, gives one an idea of how to instruct others (as a leader), and how to perform a task rather than relying upon someone else. Although some feel student council is a "playground" for the elite or a life of dreary government decorum, Jim feels it is neither, but rather as important a part of learning as one's classes.

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
